

Between January 21 and March 11, basically Martin Luther King Day to Purim, every self-identified Jew 18 years and over will have the opportunity to voice his/her opinion concerning the future of Israel's Democracy in the World Zionist Elections.

Here at Kol Tikvah, you will be given the opportunity to vote to help influence what happens in Israel and to support our Reform movement in working to achieve mutual respect and funding for all streams of Judaism, and promote religious pluralism in all aspects of Israeli society. I encourage you to vote for the ARZA slate, the largest contingent represented in the Congress. ARZA supports institutions such as the Israel Religious Action Center (IRAC), which toils admirably on behalf of those denied their civil and religious rights as guaranteed in Israel's own Declaration of Independence. IRAC has successfully argued Supreme Court cases which have protected asylum seekers, refugees, the LGBTQ community, women and Israeli Arab citizens of Israel.

By voting Reform, you vote your values. You also ensure that a budget of over one billion dollars is allocated to programs and institutions in Israel which represent our highest values and ideals. Our CKT Co-Chairs, Hedy and Bruce Cohn, along with our ARZA Committee will make voting as easy as possible. We will set up online voting stations at important CKT functions and events. Every adult member of our congregation, as well as non-members who identify as Jewish, are encouraged to vote their conscience. For those who may be unaware, the WZC was established by the founding father of Modern Zionism, Theodor Herzl in 1897, holding the first such Congress in Basel, Switzerland.

Since then, delegates from around the world gather in Jerusalem every five years to express our support for the Jewish State and ensure its vitality for generations yet unborn. Look for information about how you can vote online in the coming months.

2020—PERFECT VISION

2020...I can't control my mind from orienting that number from the year to 20:20 vision. After all, the year is new in my vocabulary, but 20:20 vision has been the default meaning for my entire life. So, instead of ignoring that temptation, I will yield to it. What are my visions for the coming years? How do I envision myself? Will I envision these with perfect 20:20 vision or will I know if I was correct only as life enfolds? I pose the same questions to you.

Questions, questions, and more questions.

Envisioning the future of our world can be discomforting because of a feeling of helplessness or obliviousness or lack of concern. We can dismiss it as 'beyond our control.' It seems that those capable of assessing the future have been blessed with special gifts – super intelligence or spiritual enlightenment. Biblically, we hold up Joseph and Daniel, the latter who actually saw the writing on the wall, as two examples who credit their ability as God-given. However, we can be like Joseph if we are willing to go beyond our intuition and take action to promote or prevent what we foresee. In contrast, we can be like the Israelites who ignored the pleading of the prophets who repeatedly warned them of immanent destruction, suffering, and punishment if they failed to change their ways. They neither saw nor heeded the words of those who could see. As we consider the comparison – one results in life; the other in death.

Are we powerless to do anything but accept change? Will nationalism dominate the geo-political world to the point that individuality equates with danger? Will the economy put more money in our pockets or will the cycle reverse? Will we be touched by violence, terrorism, or war? Will anti-Semitism and religious persecution continue to foment to levels we thought were long behind us? Will storms become more frequent and more destructive? Will we just sit by and let the chips fall, or do we have the inclination to do something about it? Besides our vision of the world, we also have a vision of our place in that world. How do we envision our contribution — our footprint in the world? Are we aware that in addition to seeing, we are also seen. Would a stranger, a co-worker, a family member, a loved-one, or a friend recognize the 'you' that you think you are or you aspire to be?

Debbie Friedman made the word of the prophet Joel familiar to many of us: "The old shall dream dreams and the youth shall see visions." With all due respect to Joel, I not so humbly disagree. As someone who is closer to old than to youth, I contend that am still able to see visions of the future and, in particular, my future. Perhaps my future isn't as far and numerous in years as someone in their youth, but I find it insulting that the old can only imagine the future while asleep — too tired and resigned to make changes or move forward with the times. Whatever happened to the respect for those who have gained wisdom through life's experience? Carl Jung said, "Your visions will become clear only when you can look into your own heart. Who looks outside, dreams; who looks inside, awakes."

In this new year, may we be awakened to life's joys, strengthened to face life's challenges, and open to experiencing and affecting the ever-changing existence we call life.

What's In Our Future?

As you hopefully know, Kol Tikvah has embarked on a strategic planning effort. There are several reasons for the timing. The most critical one, in my mind, is the changing nature of religion in America. Increasingly, we are seeing rates of unaffiliation skyrocketing. As the 2013 Pew Research Center survey on Judaism showed, younger generations get their spirituality and meaning in ways other than through traditional synagogue membership. This is not unique to Judaism – the other faith traditions are experiencing the same phenomenon. In December, I went to the annual conference of my professional organization, National Association for Temple Administration (NATA). The theme was Navigating New Realities. For those who

went to the Union for Reform Judaism (URJ) biennial, which directly followed the NATA conference, they heard much of the same message.

The session that was most fascinating to me was "The Future of Membership and Belonging," presented by Rev. Sue Phillips and Casper ter Kuile of Harvard Divinity School, who study and teach about congregational polity and religious innovation. They theorize that people have the same needs as they always have: belonging (being known and accepted), becoming (what we hope for ourselves), beyond (believing in something bigger than oneself). It is the distribution system that is broken. Jewish community used to be one-stop shopping – you could go to one place and get all of one's needs met. As more kids grow up not having been involved in synagogue life, they are less inclined to go back to synagogue since they were never there in the first place. Synagogues, like other institutions, are good at making things the way they have always been – keeping things the same. Yet, what we need to do is change the way in which we offer things. There is a gap between what people's needs are and where they go to get those needs met. Increasingly, for the younger demographic, it is not at synagogue – at least in the traditional sense.

Our job is to transmit tradition in a way that allows the next chapter of Judaism to live.

Phillips and Kuile theorize that we need to unbundle. We should think of synagogue activities like apps. There is an app for everything and everyone fills their phones/mobile devices with the apps that are meaningful to them. We need to build relationships and find new ways of helping individuals express tradition.

The professional staff at Kol Tikvah have been talking about these concepts for some time and are actively in dialogue with the Board and leadership about redesigning what Kol Tikvah offers and how we offer it. There are distinct populations within the congregation – some who like things exactly the way they are, some who want something very different, and everything in between. The challenge is to create something that fits our community where they are now and to do so in a way that is economically sustainable. It is a huge challenge.

Leadership can get the best information by hearing directly from you, and thus the strategic planning process. Focus groups and surveys are already being formulated. This will be a fluid process for the next several months. So when you get that call to participate in a focus group or an email to participate in a survey, please respond "Hineyni" "Here I am." We need to hear from you. Together, we will ensure that Kol Tikvah is strong, vibrant, and the most effective outlet for Jewish life in the greater Parkland area for generations to come.





In the fall semester our students focused on several Jewish values tied to the Jewish holidays. For example, we learned the value of *teshuvah*—taking responsibility for our actions, when learning about the High Holy Days. We learned about *gevurah*— using our inner strength to do what is right, when learning about Chanukah. For about a month we studied the Jewish value of *b'tzelem Elohim*— honoring the image of God in ourselves in others. This value permeated through our religious school, early childhood center and youth group programming under the leadership of Jennifer Levin, Assistant Director of Youth Education and Engagement. Through reflective activities, stories, music and more our students learned that we all have the Divine spark within each and every one of us. Each age group learned developmentally appropriate ways to understand this value – from celebrating our differences to understanding the importance of being inclusive.

Over the past 5 ½ years I have been honored to get to know you and your children, assist our community during one of its most painful times, and create Jewish educational programs to help you engage with our synagogue on many levels. I am sad to say, "goodbye," but look forward to continue being with you as my family will call Kol Tikvah our spiritual and Jewish educational home.

Recently our school was fortunate enough to have a special visitor, Mayor Christine Hunschofsky, who took time out of her busy schedule to read to our classes. One of the books she read was, One by Kathryn Otoshi. This book, at its core is about standing up to bullying and friendship. Uniquely enough, the story is told by using only colors and numbers to convey the meaning and feelings that people have. Blue is picked on by Red: "Red is HOT. Blue is NOT." The other colors like Blue but are intimidated by the bluster so they say nothing, and soon Red is bossing everyone around.

But then One comes. It is funny and brave and confronts Red: "If someone is mean and picks on me, I, for One, stand up and say, No." All the other colors follow One's lead and become numbers too. The rest of the numbers stick up for Blue, but offer Red the opportunity to join in the counting, and all ends well. Red is not ostracized but included in the game, and the essential point of one person making a difference is emphasized by the ending: "Sometimes it just takes ONE." This lesson teaches us the importance of how we treat our friends, how we respect them and appreciate them.

If someone does something mean or says something mean it's ok to stand up for them and say something.9

According to the Torah, each individual must love each other like his or her own self. Teaching these concepts should be part of everyday life both in the home and at school. Character building in Early Childhood is essential and is done by teaching Jewish values. Gemilut Hasadim "the act of loving-kindness" is a fundamental social value we teach. It is a mitzvah that one must complete without the anticipation of receiving something in return. Fostering an understanding of Jewish values can be done through teaching Jewish text and traditions. Jewish text and traditions are taught through creativity in a classroom allowing a child to explore these values, nurture their curiosity and make dreams come to life. Through song, story-telling and various activities, Gemilut Hasadim is integrated in our curriculum and taught throughout the year. By beginning the day in circle time and singing songs such as Shalom Chaverim and Mispacha, we instill the meaning of love, friendship and family. With activities as simple as blending colored Play-Doh ("hugging blue and yellow to make green") we can discuss love and friendship while addressing the science of mixing colors. For many, our school is the beginning of a child's Jewish education. Here at PJG ECC, our goal is to teach values to our children and translate them into educational lessons that will provide opportunities for children and their parents to explore ways in which to live them throughout their lives.



"Jacob left Beersheba and set out for Haran. He came upon a certain place and stopped there for the night." It was night, so he laid himself down to sleep and had a dream of a ladder raising up from earth to heaven. He encounters God. He wakes and says, 'How awesome is this place. Surely God is present in this place."

Moses was tending the flock of his father-in-law when he encountered the burning bush on Horeb, the mountain of God. God instructs him, "Remove your sandals from your feet, for the place on which you stand is holy ground." We can't expect such monumental moments of revelation as we walk through places that have been touched, blessed, or scarred by the history of generations of Jews who preceded us, but the experience of walking in their footsteps ties us to them. We come to realize that the events that shaped their lives would eventually affect our own lives. I have made numerous trips to Paris, a city of which I have a special appreciation. I have visited most, if not all its significant Jewish museums. These museums are filled with Jewish artifacts and history, but they pale in comparison to two particular sites I encountered — by accident. The first one is located just behind Notre Dame Cathedral. It is a memorial to the Parisian Jews who were rounded-up and transported to the camp at Drancy and later sent to various death camps. Far beyond a dedication to their memory, it is the sight of departure along the Seine of thousands of Jews on their final journey.

As much as one reads or watches movies of our history, there is nothing that compares to walking in the footsteps of those whose lives were shaped by history – by events of their making or beyond their control. The same can be said by meeting and conversing with fellow Jews who make their lives in these places. What is their experience? How are Jews treated there? How does the future portend their continued presence there? We are planning and gathering travelers for this coming summer's Jewish Heritage Journey (June 11-21) to Vienna, Prague, Terezin, and Berlin. The three major cities very well could be where your family originates. There's personal history in these locations. You all have stories. The deadline to sign up is in February and we need at least twenty people for the trip to come to fruition. If you have participated in our congregational pilgrimages to Israel, you are aware of the knowledge you've gained by first-hand contact with the locals and have returned as a group connected by the sharing of a wonderful unique experience. To experience the riches of our history in these locations under the inspiring knowledgeable tour guides we have engaged will evoke similar feelings of connection as I encountered by chance in Paris – except you won't have to depend on it being by accident.


